We started our topic by discussing different heroes within our community. We have explored the role of a nurse, a police officer and a firefighter, as well as finding out about animals who help us. We even had a visit from Spongebob, the Giant African Snail!





The children have enjoyed pretending to be doctors and patients in the role-play area. We often have a long line of children waiting to see the 'doctor', just like real life! Following on from this we have explored the topic 'healthy eating' and why it's important to keep our bodies healthy, especially if we want to become a hero. 
In maths the children have been working on their problem solving skills, taking part in some fun investigations,. Other topics that we have covered have been money, days of the week, time, measure, addition and subtraction.

We have been really impressed with the children's story writing. They used their imagination and creativity to write their own Fireman Sam story. During learning zone, the children have been writing for a variety of purposes including: how to care for a plant, missing posters and letters/postcards.

It is clear to see how much the children's independence skills have developed. This is encouraging as they are vital as they prepare to move to Year 2 in September. Where do people like to go on days out? English Maths

This half term the children have showcased their creativity by writing their own version of the traditional tale, Hansel and Gretel. Not only have they applied their knowledge of fairy tale language, they have also taken their writing to the next level by making adventurous word choices (adjectives, adverbs, similes, etc.) and by ensuring that they use different sentence starters. It is so wonderful to see them using everything they have learnt so far this year to improve their writing. All the while, the children have been very mindful of the fact that they were writing stories to entertain the residents of The Birches. We are confident that the residents will be blown away by the high standard and creativity of the stories!

Art

We linked our art with our Science topic on

seasons. We have used pastels to create a vivid display of the different seasons within landscapes and wildlife. We also had a fantastic time participating in the Woodley Cluster Tray Garden project—Highwood children were part of the teams which finished third, second AND first!

What an amazing interactive time we have had during our Maths lessons this term! We learnt all about measures, including length and height, mass/weight, capacity and telling time. The children used metre sticks and

rulers to investigate the length and height of everyday objects. They also used balance,





kitchen and electric scales to measure and compare the mass of objects found in the classroom. They soon

realised that just because an object is big, it is not necessarily heavy. The recent surry weather enabled us to work outside when



investigating the capacity of different containers. They know that the width of the container is just as important as the height when comparing capacity.

Topic and Science

We looked at many options for a nice day out and how our choice could be affected by the weather. This linked so well with our current Science topic of the weather and seasons. The children thoroughly enjoyed tracking the weather in their weather diaries. Next we are focussing on how to keep ourselves safe whilst out and about.



Year 2 News

'What is the difference between a cake and a biscuit?'

Not long before it will be your child's final half term in Year 2! The time has absolutely flown.

The children have now finally completed all of their SATs during this half term! The children tried so hard and were excellent at coping without adult support during this time. They definitely deserve the half-term break!

We have begun our new topic "what is the

difference between a cake and a biscuit?" The children started this topic by finding their favourite cakes and biscuits and discussing why



these are their favourite. In DT, they have learnt about hygiene and mixing by baking biscuits. They have then used this in their literacy to write instructions about how to bake biscuits and we will be inviting you in to bake biscuits by following your child's instructions next half term!

In maths we revisited many concepts, includ-

ing time, money, pattern and measurement. At the start of the term, the children learnt how to use a ruler for measurement and when to use mm, cm and m. They could also tell me how many mm in a cm and cm in a m! The children particularly enjoyed revisiting mon-

ey and solved some challenging exercises, such as making 25p ten different ways and solving worded money problems! When



we revisited time, Year 2 learnt the differ-

ence between clockwise CLOCKWISE and anticlockwise. Can they show you which way is clockwise? They were



excellent at showing quarter, half, and three quarter turns going clockwise/anticlockwise when using an arrow.

In science we are learning about plants and asking the question, what do plants need to grow and be healthy? We have drawn diagrams and learnt the names for different parts of a plant. We have also begun an in-

vestigation into what plants need to grow and survive. During this we have discussed fair test and how to test objectively. We will continue with our investiga-



tions next term. I'm sure they will give us interesting results.

Finally, some children will be retaking the phonics screening check. So, this term we also worked hard on our phonics. The test will be the second week back to school and we need to be ready! The children seem confident and know their sounds well. Please read with them as much as possible, especially over half term to prepare them.

English - Discussion Text

The children will, before the end of term, be presenting their balanced arguments to the Highwood judges so they can decide the fate of the wolves.

In reading, year 4 have been exploring the text 'Sir Gawain and the Green Knight' by Michael Morpurgo. We have been using the interesting vocabulary to write descriptions of weapons and inferring characteristics from the Green Knight's ac-



Maths - Angles, shape and division

Year 4 have been working hard to understand the features of different

2D shapes, including lines of symmetry, parallel or perpendicular sides and types of angles. They are able to identify, name and order different angles

We have been looking at different ways of dividing numbers this term, such as using the inverse, number

inside polygons.



lines and distributive law. Before the end of term we will be moving onto methods of dividing three digit numbers by one digit numbers using exchanging.



Geography - Settlements

Year 4 have done a lot of work this term on early settlements and why people chose to settle in certain areas. We used google maps to explore differ-

ent castles and looked at the features of the surrounding landscape. The children were then able to explain which sites were best for settling and what the limitations were of each.



We explored the area around the school and decided where would be the best place to build a two person mini castle to defend the site from potential Norman invaders. Then, using our IT skills,



the children took photographs of the locations, air drop them to the teacher iPad and screen shared them to the whiteboard.

Science - States of matter.

In science, the children have been learning about different states of matter. They have learned how everything is made of molecules and how the molecules behave differently in solids, liquids and gases.

'Are Heroes and Villains so different?'

Literacy - Myths and Legends

Our topic is focussing on Heroes and Villains but with an Ancient Greek slant. We have read a variety of Greek Myths in order to understand how the structure and the language



entertain the reader. In particular, we have been enjoying 'Theseus and the Minotaur' and learning how to write a description of a hero who impresses with his brilliance and a beast that terrifies and disgusts!



In the afternoons, we have used our research skills to find out about Ancient Greek warfare and about the differ-🛿 ences in culture between Athens and Sparta. This

led to a lively debate about whether the children would have preferred to have been an Athenian or a Spartan.

Maths

In Maths, we have been working on finding equivalence. We are able to convert fractions so that they share a common denominator and convert mixed numbers to improper fractions and vice versa. We are now able to use this knowledge to add and subtract fractions. We are also able to express fractions as decimals and percentages. Arithmetic has continued to be a focus and we have begun a daily practice of our calculation skills PE as well as continuing to improve our times tables. As you can see, we have worked very hard!

Science

During science we have been learning about lifecycles, comparing them and learning what makes each lifecycle unique. We have investigated Highwood school grounds Have a great Half Term. in order to find examples of living organisms at different stages in their life cycles. We used our scientific skill of observation to draw different stages of the life cycle. Follow us on Twitter: @HighwoodPrimYr5

We planted a variety of seeds and are taking regular measurements of their growth (stem length and number of leaves). We have been learning about plant reproduction. We dissected flowers in order to identify the male and female parts and learnt about



the processes of pollination and fertilisation.





This term we have been improving our fitness and athletic skills with Mr Edwards. And of course, we have thoroughly enjoyed being able to go swimming at Reading Blue Coat School.

'What is the secret to success?'

It has very much been an intense mental workout for the Year 6 pupils this half term: SATs has dominated, as it has nationally for pupils at this time of year. However, the Y6 pupils worked incredibly hard to prepare themselves for the "big week" and tackled the tests with focus and calm. Mrs Haden, Mrs Render, Mr Hickey, Mrs Vaux and myself are extremely proud of how they handled the pressure of the tests. At one point, some people seemed to be excited, some even said they enjoyed it! I truly feel that every child gave the tests their best effort which is all we can ask of our pupils.

English

Alongside revision for SATs, the Year 6 pupils have been utilising their buzzing imaginations in lots and lots of writing. They began the term by writing persuasively - writing a persuasive letter to Mr Hickey to try and convince him to NOT go ahead with his fictitious plan (not that I told the Y6s!) to ban

P.E. - we looked at the health benefits of physical exercise, both mentally and physically and then used this information to inform our argument.

Currently, with the "excitement" of SATs now behind us, they are busy planning a narrative

piece based on our novel last half term whereby a cruel and wicked schoolmaster of a workhouse is described alongside the tense and chilling atmosphere he creates!

Science

As mentioned previously, in science, we have been looking at the benefits of exercise, both mentally and physically and used research to inform our persuasive writing where the pupils argued for their right to a P.E. lesson. We have also re-visited our understanding of light in order to showcase our explanation writing skills as we explain, as scientists, how a periscope works.


Art




