

Welcome to the Foundation Stage Newsletter for this term! We have been really busy continuing with our topic "Why is the sky blue?" and with all our other learning - take a look!

We started our term off with 'Jack and the beanstalk'. We started by learning the story and using the opportunity of climbing the beanstalk, to look at whether the 'Sky is blue' from up there. The children also had the opportunity to grow their own bean seed and care for and watch it as it grew.







The children were very excited when the 'Planetarium came to visit. We watched an amazing show, showing us planets, stars, nebulas and the galaxy containing our solar system. Many

of the children know the names of the planets in our solar system, that the moon is a satellite and the largest planet is called Canis Majoris



F1 looked at the Jack and the Beanstalk story and then created their own version. F2 also explored and sequenced this story and looked at lots of different versions. We also looked at the elements needed for a good story.

Year 1 News


Mrs Vaux and Miss Amor

All of our learning this half term has continued to be focused on our topic question 'Will we play with the same toys when we are older?'

This half term, in literacy, we have been writing to entertain, with the focus on story writing. The main book we have focused on is 'Little Red Riding Hood'. We've completed many tasks around the books including lots of different ways of retelling the story before writing the beginning, middle and end of the story.



When we wrote about the story we broke it down into a clear beginning, middle and end. We created story boards for each part and then every child individually wrote the story. The extra challenge was to include adjectives and time connectives where appropriate.



We continue to develop our phonics knowledge but now there is a large emphasis on spelling. We are encouraging all pupils to carefully consider which grapheme they use for each word. For example spelling like using the i_e split diagraph. In maths we learned about fractions again focusing on finding a quarter of a shape and then a quarter of a quantity. The children loved exploring this concept and understood that when quartering you must have 4 equal parts that are the same.



Following on from finding halves and quarters we learnt about directional language. The children learnt the terms, forwards, backwards, half turn, quarter turn and three-quarter turn.



They used the beetbots, directed their partner and created mazes to explore this concept.

Finally we have started to explore the concept of time. We have started by thinking about all of the language around time especially things that are important to the pupils like times in the day (lunch time), days of the week and months of the year. We have only just started this so

will continue next term.

In science we have continued to learn about animals. But this half term we focused on humans as animals. We have learnt all about the body parts and explanded in detail about ou



and explored in detail about our senses.

<u>Maths</u>

This term Year 2 have explored many different areas of the maths curriculum, including shape, fractions, odds and evens, arithmetic and time. They particularly enjoyed learning about



time in recent weeks and seem to have grasped



the concept of telling and writing them time with ease! During our work on shape, Year 2 used song and dance to learn shape names and the properties of 3D shapes. Can they tell you any part of the 3D shapes song? Perhaps you can test

them at home!

Literacy

Year 2 have blown us away with some of their Literacy work this term! They really embraced our key texts which we used to learn all about India. They wrote some fantastic pieces to persuade oth-

ers to use particular forms of Indian transport. They found out lots of facts about each one before writing their pieces. Many children came to the conclusion that a car may not be the fastest mode of travel and gave excel-



lent reasoning which they supported with persuasive language. Well done! More recently, we have been focusing on a non-fiction text, '*The Flower.*' The children loved the simplicity of the story and many realised that complex language does not always make a good book. They explored the



character and his emotions and even wrote in role from his point of view. Through this text, they produced some of their best work yet!

<u>Science</u>

This term we have learnt all about animals and their habitats. The children have learnt about a range of habitats and the sorts of animals that live in them. We have also learnt all about the differences between things that are living, nonliving and have never been alive. They can now

explain the difference between different types of animals and explain the features of each. We have looked at basic food chains. The children can now ex-



plain that all plants are producers and those that

This term has flown by and the children's hard work has been consumed by the Year 3 and 4 production. We have still managed to squeeze in lots of other learning and the class as always have made me very proud!

Ancient Egyptians - Can we survive without water?

LITERACY

Linking with our topic on rivers, this term we



have been looking at shape poetry. The children have looked at features of poems such as alliteration, repetition and similes. We wrote our own animal shape poems and then became poetry thieves as we took ideas from poems about rivers! Using a mind map we then wrote our own

short poems about the journey of a river and presented them in the shape of rivers.

NUMERACY



This term we have focused on multiplication and have been learning how to use arrays to show mul-

tiplication and division calculations. The children used our brand new place value counters to make arrays for 1-digit × 1digit and then began

to extend their un-

derstanding to multiplying 2digit numbers by 1digit. Some children even began to use the grid method to multiply even larger numbers!

TOPIC

To continue our learning about the Amazing Egyptians we used the wonderful Highwood tomb to explore mummification and to imagine we were the famous archaeologist Howard Carter. Discovering a mummy in the tomb helped us to write diary entries imagining we had found the famous mummy of King Tutankhamun!



To help us answer the 'big question', Year 3 then learnt where water comes from as we found out about the water cycle. The children used drama and then used creative writing to tell 'the story of a raindrop'.



We then used maps to locate major rivers around

the world as well as looking more closely at a river to find out about its features such as the source and

mouth! Learning about the River Nile, took us right back to our topic and the children used a

discussion technique called 'diamond 9' to consider which reasons were the most important for the River Nile.



This production was a huge undertaking and I'm so proud of all the children for all their hard work. Learning so many songs, dances and ac-

tions was quite an effort at times but it was a pleasure to see them taking so much

enjoyment from taking part in such a fantastic



sistance. We designed 3 different parachutes, each with a different variation and then tested them to see which was the most effective. Some people tested the material, some tested the length of the string, some tested the size of the parachute - there were all



sorts of different investigations. It was rather tricky to keep it a true fair test, ensuring that each parachute only had one difference - a true test of our science and maths skills! We enjoyed testing them from the wall bars in the hall! Come and ask what makes the most

effective parachute.

Changes: Does Change Always Lead to Progress?

This half-term, we have been focussing very much on Maths inventions, technology and engineering. In response to the question "Does Change Always Lead to Progress?", we have considered, researched and discussed, the positive and negative impact of technology on our lives today and on the lives of people in the 19th Century.

English

In English, we have learned to explain how things worked. We took our inspiration from some crazy explanations of how everyday appliances such as a

hoover might work. We then enjoyed explaining how some of Wallace and Gromit's crazy contraptions worked, before de-



signing our own. Towards the end of term, we were



life engineers whose jobs are to design technologies that will solve real world problems. We were inspired to invent and design our own machines which have been submitted in-

lucky enough to meet two real

to a competition. As well as needing to explain how our machines worked, we had to write a letter persuading the judging committee to choose our design.



In maths we have continued to practise our arithmetic and have improved the speed and accuracy of our calculations. We continued our work on fractions before moving on to measurement (area and perimeter) and angles.

Topic—The Industrial Revolution

We conducted our own research into an aspect of the industrial revolution that particularly interested us. Some of us made booklets and posters about the effect the industrial revolution had on workers,



and the working and living conditions of women and children. Others, investigated a particular type of technology, such as the invention of the telephone or light bulb. Others, found out about the life of different engineers such as Isambard Kingdom Brunel.

In Art, we created our own art work inspired by the industrial landscape paintings of J.S.Lowry. We copied his colour pallet and tried to create a sense of perspective



Science

In science, we have begun to find out about electicity. We have linked it to our topic question by thinking about all the electrical appliances that we use today, and what their equivalents were before the discovery (and generation) of electricity.

Wow can you believe we have reached the summer term already? We have had so much fun already but the summer term will be the best! Our topic for this term will be 'How to be a superhero'. We will begin by looking at every day heroes including the police, fire service and doctors. In literacy will be looking at lots of non-fiction books and our role play area will be a doctors surgery. In science we will be looking at how to keep our bodies healthy including what we eat. Our maths work will focus on consolidating our number knowledge including doubling and halving and number facts. Year 1



We are just about to head into the final term of Year 1. The year has gone so fast and it has been fantastic to see how much the children have progressed. The whole of the summer term will be focused on 'Where do families and people go on days out?' Our literacy will focus on different books about outings to the seaside and the park, including the book 'When the crayons came home' by Drew Daywalt and Oliver Jeffers. In maths we will continue to learn about time and then learn about money. In science we will be learning about plants and weather. We are hoping to make a garden with flowers and vegetables, which we will hopefully eat (the veggies!) by the end of Summer 2 with a nice outdoor picnic.



Year 2



It is hard to believe that we are about to be in the final term of the year! The start of this term will be largely based around SATs practice and ensuring that the children are fully prepared for the papers they will sit in May. We will do some practice papers beforehand to ensure that the children know exactly how to sit and behave during the tests. You can help at home by reading with your children and doing their number bonds with them everyday for ten minutes each. This will prepare them for the reading and arithmetic tests. In between SATs we will be asking the question 'What is the difference between a cake and a biscuit?', with a particular focus on Huntley and Palmer. This learning will allow us to focus on instruction writing, comparative writing and writing to persuade. During this topic we will also be learning about measures and at the end of the year we will use what we have learnt to do some baking! In Science the children will begin to learn about plants. We will plant our own seeds and keep a record of their progress.



Hot Off The Press...

Here is a sneak preview of our curriculum for the term ahead. It is sure to be jammed packed with exciting and engaging learning opportunities.

Year 3	The Stone Age is our summer topic, as we think about why Stonehenge was built? We will use maps to locate the famous stone circle and even enjoy a visit to the incredible site later in the summer term. As we find out more about the Stone Age we will discover how the ancient people lived and found food as well as how they chose settlements in order to sur- vive. Linking to our science topic, the children will investigate and find out more about different rocks and soils as well as understanding light and shadow. In DT we will be cre- ating our own puppets based on a Neolithic theme! In Maths, the children will be learning about shape and statistics. We will be looking at adventure stories in Literacy and then later on writing explanation texts about prehistoric animals!
Year 4 Ted Hughes the Iron	In Year 4 we will start with the question 'Why would someone build a castle here?' In Liter- acy we will be reading the book 'The Iron man', this will link nicely with Castles and armour and warfare, we will have debates on what the iron man should do and whether or not a castle should be build near to a village/town and choosing its best location, convincing each other that the castle should be built there. In maths we will be learning about shape and space, again this will have links to our topic, though designing castles. We will be making 3-D models of castles using area and perimeter and using our knowledge from last term on decimals and measuring. In D/T we will be making clay models of the Iron man using descriptions from the book. In music we will be collecting metallic objects from home to create a 'Stomp' style of music,
	 composing music using tone from the different metals. In PE the children will be learning the rules and skills of cricket and athletic events, now that the weather has started to improve. In Science we will be looking at electricity and circuits again with a link to our Iron man and life in a castle without power. Our final topic of the year will comprise of many different subjects that will aim to answer the question: Are heroes and villains so different? We will study the play <i>Macbeth</i> by William Shakespeare, looking at how different characters are portrayed. We will create our
Year 5	own heroes and villains based on the story and write our own stories around them. We will also look at the poem <i>The Highway Man</i> and debate whether he was a hero or a villain. In history, we will learn about the Ancient Greeks, looking at the roles villains and heroes played in Greek mythology. Towards the end of the topic we will also look at how ancient Greece has influenced the western world. In science, we will learn about living things and their habitat and we will study the life cycles and reproduction of some plants and mam- mals. We will also start to learn about some of the changes that occur as humans develop
Vear 6	The beginning of the summer term will see us knuckle down, focus as we prepare the best we can for SATs week (8th May). Our first 3 weeks back will be mainly focussed on revision of maths, grammar and spelling, as well as practising reading comprehension techniques. We will make a start on our topic, "Who wants to be a millionaire?" by looking at what it means to be successful, and how we can take responsibility for leading a healthy and happy life. We will study the lives of successful entrepreneurs and we will start to think about what projects we could do to become more enterprising. In Science, we will look at how our bodies work and how we can live a healthy lifestyle by eating a balanced diet and exer- cising.

I want to take a moment to mention to the children and parents about the value of representing the school. I feel this is a very important part of our make up and what makes us proud. 

Family Centre



We have lots of different workshops and sessions coming up over the next term in the family centre.

Alongside our 15-week English classes, of which another has just started, we are very pleased that Bracknell and Wokingham college have offered us a 10 week Maths course for parents. As well as the brushing up on Maths course, this is a great way to support your child with their Maths work at Highwood.

We have our regular stay and play on a Tuesday morning 9-10.15am. This is for any parents or carers who have younger preschool children and includes toy, craft, a snack and a song session. It is a great introduction to the school for young children who will be attending in the future.

On 16th May we have a workshop for parents with supporting their child with anxiety. All children (and adults) experience anxiety or nerves at different points in their lives. This is a perfectly normal response to some situations, but can get out of hand sometimes. Come to our workshop run by trained counsellors and find out ways of supporting children when it can get a little out of hand and learn some strategies for helping children cope.

In May we will also be running some workshops for parents and carers on supporting children on preparing your child and supporting them with the transition to secondary school. Letters will be going home to all year 6 children after Easter which contains more information so please keep an eye out for these.

School Car Park



As you are aware, Highwood is expanding over the next few years and as a result there will be a significant increase in the number of staff working at the school. In preparation for this increase, we are reviewing parental access to the school car park.

In order to be transparent, we have devised a set of criteria that we will use to judge individual applications. If approved, parents will be allocated a parking permit which will need to be shown to our site controller when access to the school site is required.

Car Park Permit Criteria		
Disabled badges	Parents will be permitted to access the car park, providing the person that is named on the badge is in the vehicle.	
Volunteers	Any school volunteers will be allowed to use the car park on the day they are volunteering - a list will be kept in the school office of the agreed days for each volunteer.	
Medical Needs	Children or adults that are temporarily incapacitated or experiencing medical issues can apply for a permit. The school will require confirmation from a medical professional that car parking assistance is required.	
Breakfast Club / After- school Club	Parents accessing either facility outside of school hours have permission to park on the school site. This will be permitted prior to 8:30am and after 4pm	
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Unfortunately, parents requiring access due to having children in different schools, will no longer have access to the car park - This will include families accessing the Speech and Language Resource.
