What another busy term we have had! Hopefully you will have seen in my recent bulletins that we are making great progress in our development journey. During this term, I had requested that the Local Authority conduct some monitoring visits so that we can gain an external perspective as to how well we are progressing. The monitoring that has taken place this term has been:

A SEND Review, which consisted of:

- A review of relevant paperwork and policies
- Discussions with the Headteacher
- Discussions with the Inclusion Manager
- Discussions with relevant Governors
- Discussions with a group of Teaching Assistants
- Paired visits to EYFS, Year 2, Year 4 and Year 6 classrooms
- A discussion with previously identified SEND pupils from Years 2, 4 and 6
- A review of all books belonging to these pupils

A two day whole school Review, which consisted of:

- A review of relevant paperwork and policies
- Discussions with all Senior Leaders
- Discussions with relevant Governors
- Deep Dives into Reading, Maths, History and Geography with relevant curriculum leaders
- Book scruting
- A meeting with the school council.

The feedback from both of these reviews was extremely positive and identified significant strengths in the work we are doing. Inside this newsletter, you will see how rich our curriculum provision is and the fantastic opportunities that our children have - this was a strength identified by the Local Authority I would encourage you to read all the pages from each year group so that you can start to build up an understanding of how our 3D curriculum is being built and how your children's learning is being built on and developed each year they are here.

When words like 'unique' and 'innovative' are being used to describe our approach by professionals with no links to the school, it really makes all the hard work that the school has put in worthwhile.

Welcome to our Foundation 1 News. We have had a very busy first half of the Spring Term in F1. We have begun exploring our new topic which is 'Why do things change?' and have welcomed a new group of F1 children into the setting.

Having learnt all about Autumn last term, we started this term by exploring the other three seasons in the year. The children participated in lots of different craft and sensory activities to help them to explore and learn about each individual season and what they will experience in each one. For example we had a mini beach sensory tuft tray and explored the ice out in the garden when learning about Winter.


Welcome to the Foundation Stage Newsletter for this term! We have been really busy learning about space as part of our topic: 'How is the World filled with colour' Take a look!


The children have been looking at 'teen' numbers' and investigating one more and one less. We have also been learning to add and subtract single digit numbers using concrete objects to help us.

We have had a great start to the spring term! We started the term with bike ability. The children showed great perseverance and encouragements for each other.


Will we play with the same toys when we are older?

tions of numbers. We know how to find 1/2 and 1/4.





English

part of this term. To stimulate Year 3's imagination, we went on a lovely walk around Southlake park to collect vocabulary that could be used in our writing.



Whole Class Reading



We have begun reading the classic 'Wind in the Willows' this term and already the children can see the differences between each of the character's personalities. There is so much wonderful vocabulary in this

book and the children are enjoying magpying it and using it in their own writing. We've even learnt about personification and used it to write our own class poems! Maths

Fractions, fractions and more fractions! This has been our focus so far this term. The children



have been able to bring in their prior knowledge of division to help them find fractions of amounts.

They are also a lot more confident at using the bar

model to not only find fractions of amounts but to also find equivalent fractions. It's great to see that more children are moving onto reasoning and problem solving activi-

ties within lessons which really goes to show how well they are grasping these new concepts.

Key Question

We started off our new key question gathering information on the different ways in which water is used daily and worldwide. The children were surprised to see how much of an impact water has on our lives. They also had great fun designing their

own boats to introduce the importance of how water can be used as a form of transport. After half term, we will be going on an exciting trip to Henley River and Rowing Museum to find out even more about the importance of water.

Furthermore, we have been looking at Roman artefacts and inferring what they tell us about the Roman civilization as well as investigating some of the key dates in the Roman time-

Science

This term we have been learning about food chains and the organisms that make up each stage - decomposers seemed to be a popular category! We are now exploring states of matter before looking at how water changes state during the water cy-

Maths

We have finished our multiplication and division and are now exploring fractions and decimals. We have been discussing what a fraction and a decimal are and

how we can portain (show them in different ways before looking at fraction & decimal equivalence.

We have also been working on

writing our explanations and talking through how to do this so that when we are reasoning, we give highquality answers.



History

We have been learning all about the Roman invasion of Britain and why the Romans found Britain so irresistible

PE

In PE, half of us have been going to Bluecoat school to enjoy a spot of swimming and Mr Edwards reports that the Year 4's have really thrown themselves (not literally!) into their swimming with great effort and enthusiasm!

English

All our English this term has been around the

Maths

Key Question Lessons



Our key question for this term is 'Is Invasion Ever Justified?', where we are basing our learning all around The Vikings and The Anglo-Saxons. To kick off our topic, we started by completing our very own archaeological dig where we dug

questions to try and learn more about the civilisation. Through the topic, we have also looked at what physical and human geography fea-

tures might come into play when deciding on why you would invade a country, learnt about the town names we have now that derive from the Anglo Saxons and learnt about how the country was split into six key kingdoms.

Year 6 News

We have been considering our question, What Would a World Without War Look Like?'

What is War?



We started the topic by thinking about what we understood by war and what a world with war is like. We then drew pictures to show what a world without war might look and feel like. We have also looked

at war from the view point of different religions and of Christians in particular.

Why War Does War Happen?

Using WW2 as an example, we thought about the causes of war. We learnt about concepts of fascism, ideology, and lebensraum.





We thought about the reasons Hitler invaded the countries that neighboured Germany and

why Great Britain declared war when it did.

Which Parts of the World Does War Affect?



The stimulus for this question, was our class book, 'The Boy at the Back of the Class' which is a story about a Syrian refugee. In order to understand what Ahmet (the child in the

book) had experienced, we learnt about the civil war in

Syria and the plight of refugees. We were incredibly lucky enough to have a visit from the CEO of skt welfare, a charity that helps Syrian refugee children in camps on the Turkish border.




How Does War Affect the Lives of Families?



For much of this term, we have learnt about the effects of war (and WW2 in particular) on families. So far, we have concentrated

on Great Britain (we will be making comparisons with Germany next half term). As authors, we have written some powerful description of The Blitz. As historians,

we have evaluated the reliability of different sources when finding out about the mixed experiences of evacuees. We then roleplayed these different experiences in order to empathise with the children of WW2. We also found out about the role of women in WW2, and the legacy this had for the role of women in today's society. More recently we have found out about rationing and assessed its importance to morale. We couldn't



believe that sweets had been rationed!

PE

In PE with Mr Edwards, the children have been learning about fitness and how important it is to exercise as well as learning how to coach others in ball skills. In gymnastics, we have concentrated on body management and balances.

Maths

Arithmetic has continued to be a priority as we have persevered to better our own weekly arithmetic scores. We have also revisited fractions. This time, finding the equivalents between decimals, fractions and percentages. We have also used our knowledge of factors and multiples to find equivalent fractions and to simplify fractions in the most efficient way. Follow us on Twitter

KS2 wrote biographies of Roald Dahl together and then chose their own celebrities to research and write biographies for. Guess who they chose?










Maths - Reasoning with Fractions and Solving Number Problems



Reading Together At Home: Our Top Tips!



Quality Time

Pick a time of day where you can both devote all your attention and time to each other and reading. Five minutes of quality reading together, on a regular basis, is far better than reading for longer when you both are distracted. Make this time a special time!

Before you read, chat about what has happened so far. What have you both liked? Who is your favourite character and why? What do you expect to happen next? Does this story remind you of a film or another book you've come across?

It's Only Words...

- If your child is struggling to read a word, get them to "sound it out" and break the word into its component sounds e.g. "playing" would be "p 1 ay 1 n g" then you blend it together.
- Explore words your child doesn't know together – tell them the meaning and put it in a sentence or even refer to a dictionary!

It's just like what we do at school...

We are constantly asking your child questions about what we are all reading and here are some that you could try at home when reading together to replicate the level of thinking we practise in school – why not try sharing your answers to them too?

Who is your favourite character and why?

How do you think the author wants you to feel after reading this sentence? Why is that? What words has the writer used to make this place seem scary/exciting/ magical?

> What word would you use to describe this person/place? Why is that?

Based on what we've read, what do you think will happen next?

> What has just happened on this page? Can you summarise it for me?

Beyond a book!

- Reading Role Models! Children are great imitators (as we all know!). Why not let them catch you reading for
 pleasure at home? It doesn't have to be a novel; it could be a recipe book, a non-fiction book, a newspaper or
 magazine!
- Visit The Local Library! If you're not already a member, why not sign up at your local library and make regular trips together there to try out new books or magazines? Libraries are great places to relax, unwind and discover a new story!
- And Finally...why not find out about other books by an author your child likes? If there is a film version of a book, why not watch it together before sharing the book?
