Play is particularly important for younger children. Pre-school children learn through the EYFS National Curriculum, which is inherently play-based. It is the foundation of childhood development in terms of language, emotional intelligence and regulation, creativity, and intellectual reasoning.

Some activities do have more play potential than others. All you need to do is provide the space, resources, and time. Below are some ideas of 'invitations to play' that you can set up in the home to provide rich play activities for your child:

- Junk modelling using recyclable materials such as boxes, yoghurt pots etc.
- Threading pasta onto string
- Water play using tipping and pouring
- Sand play
- Playdough
- Dress up and role play
- Doll and character play
- Drawing and painting
- Blocks, jigsaws and shape sorters
- Music, dancing and singing
- Imaginative play
- Running, jumping, climbing, swinging
- Nature play
- Sensory play
- Basic board games
- Cooking and pretend-cooking
