WHY DO CHANGES HAPPEN?

We have had a very busy second half of term in F1 and have had lots of fun engaging in new experiences and exploring further into our topic of 'why do changes happen?'. The children have really developed their independence skills towards the end of term and are trying really hard to do things for themselves as well as helping each other to do things they find difficult.

The highlight of this half of the term has been our visit from Miller's Ark, the travelling farm. The children were very excited during the build up to this event and it did not disappoint. The children got to have a fascinating hands-on experience with some animals they may have never come across before. They explored what the different animals ate and what their names were as babies. They were able to feed the goats and hold the chickens and guinea pigs.





The children have also been exploring different stories about familiar farm animals which has enabled them to delve deeper into this terms topic. One story we have been learning about is 'The Little Red Hen'. The children experienced the process of making and baking bread rolls (just like the hen does in the story), learning how the dough changes consistencies through the different stages. This story also enabled us to learn more about

what it means to be a good friend.

We have been lucky enough this half of term in F1 to be given some tadpoles to take care of and watch grow. We have been learning all about the life cycle of a frog and have watched our frog spawn hatch and turn into tadpoles which was very exciting! We are looking forward to exploring into the life cycles of some different creatures/ animals next term!





This half of term we also celebrated 'World Book Day'. The children all looked fantastic in their costumes of their favourite story characters and had lots of fun focusing on the story of 'Goldilocks and the Three Bears'. Maths

This term Year 2 have explored many different

areas of the maths curriculum, including shape, fractions, odds and evens, arithmetic and time. They particularly enjoyed learning about time in recent weeks and seem to have grasped the concept of telling



and writing the time with ease! During our work on statistics the children created tally charts, pictograms and block graphs to show their favourite character, animal and more!

Literacy

Year 2 have blown us away with some of their Literacy work this term! They really embraced our key texts which we used to learn all about India. They wrote some fantastic pieces to persuade the villagers not to let the vicious tiger out of the

cage! More recently, we have been focusing on a non-fiction text, '*The Tiger and the Wise Man*.' The children loved the



simplicity of the story and many realised that



complex language does not always make a good book. They explored the character and his emotions and even wrote in role from the Wise Man's point of view. Through this text, they produced some of their best

work yet!

Science

This term we have learnt all about animals and their habitats. The children have learnt about a range of habitats and the sorts of animals that live in them. We have also learnt all about the differences between things that are living, nonliving and have never been alive. They can now explain the difference between different types of habitats and the animals which live in them. We

have looked at basic food chains. The children can now explain that all plants are producers and those that eat them are consum-

LITERACY

SCIENCE

In literacy this term we have been writing persuasive letters. After looking at what it means to be persuasive we wrote letters to our local councillor asking her to help reduce the amount of plastic we use. We had a great SPLAT afternoon

linked to writing where the children were able to show off their creative writing skills.

On World Book day we dressed up in



fantastic costumes and then explored the picture book 'The Stone Lion.'

MATHS

In maths we have been using our times table knowledge to help multiply and divide numbers bigger than the times tables. We have been thinking about using different methods to solve problems. Then we used our

number knowledge to help solve word problems.



In science we have been looking at plants and what each of the different parts are for. We have designed and



carried out our own experiments. We also had visits from some engi-

neers. They explained what they do for a living and showed us some interesting experiments that they do.

TOPIC

We continued with our topic on water and looked at cities around the world that are running out of water. We

then looked at the River Nile and the important role it played in the lives of the ancient Egyptians.



PRODUCTION

The children took part in our year 3 and 4 production of 'Highwood through the ages: a musical medley.' They worked really hard and did some fantastic singing, dancing and acting.

We have continued to explore our question 'Has the invention of flight had a positive impact on the world?' and an interesting visit from a flying explorer, Christy Huffington-Brouge!

English—Adventure stories

After a disastrous mix up with luggage, year 4 ended up with a case belonging to an explorer named Christy. The children decided that



the most responsible option of course was not to return it to the delivery company, but to root through the contents looking for clues! After some deduction, the children were able to make contact with Christy and invited her in to collect her belongings. This chance meeting has led to some exciting writing, with the children creating adventure stories that Christy can add to her upcoming novel.

Maths - Fractions and problem solving

In maths we have been spending a lot of time exploring fractions. The children were able to work together to teach each other how to find fractions and solve problems involving them. We learned

about area and perimeter, creating our own 2D creatures for our mathematical zoo and solving complex problems.



Music

In music the children have been learning to play the Cornet with Mr Ransom from Berkshire Maes-



tros, this will be continuing next term. It has been fantastic to see the children so excited to use the instruments and they are slowly moving from just noise to tuneful performances.

Topic—Engineering

The children were very lucky this term to have visits from three different engineers. They explored what an engineer does in their job and learned what they need in order to become one in the fu-

ture. They were then able to use this knowledge to help our explorer friend with another problem she had, how to help disabled people explore the Ama-



zon jungle. The children created designs for devices that would support people with a range of disabilities and wrote letters to persuade people to develop their products. They then entered this into a competition for the Primary Engineers Programme so fingers crossed!

Highwood through the ages

The main event this half term which involved both Years 3 and 4, was that of the musical production. The children performed on three occasions, once as a dress rehearsal to the school, then an afternoon performance on the Wednesday and an evening one on the Thursday.

The children worked extremely hard to learn their words, all of the narrator roles had lots of lines to learn, but they pulled it off in true Highwood style and made everyone very proud. Every member of year 4 played an integral part in the production and they couldn't have done any better.

Science

In our learning about forces, we have been designing our own investigations to test air resistance. We designed 3 different parachutes, each with a different variation and then tested them to see which was the most effective. Some people tested the material, some tested the length of the string, some tested the size of the parachute - there were all sorts of different investigations. It was rather tricky to keep it a true fair test, ensuring that each parachute only had one difference - a true test of our science and maths skills! visited by some engineers who came to talk to us about their jobs and to tell us more about engineering. They gave really interesting talks and we were able to ask them ques-

tions. We then had an opportunity to work with Vicky from AWE. Then, we created our own new inventions to be sent off to a Young Engineers competition. We can't wait to see if any of our entries are winners - keep your fingers crossed!



Carters Visit

As part of our topic focus on Fairgrounds, we have been working extremely hard in making our own Fairground models. We started by looking at different mechanisms and



how they are used. We then had to decide on which fairground ride we would like to make. To help us decide we were extremely lucky to have a visit from Georgina from 'Carters Steam Fair'. She talked

about the vintage rides and how they worked and a little bit about what life is like working on a travelling fairground.



The children then started to design

their ideas before finally getting to make their rides. Many of the rides move and have working motors of which the children are extremely proud.

World book day.

The children and staff all dressed up for the day. We worked in our own classrooms, we chose 'Leon and the place between' as our

Does Change Always Lead to Progress?

This half-term, we have been focussing very much on the Industrial Revolution and the changes that it brought about - both the positive and the negative. In response to the question "Does Change Always Lead to Progress?", we have considered, researched and discussed, the impact of the advances in science and technology that occurred during the Victorian era. We have reflected on both that which improved life for people in Britain and that which made life harder.

English

In English, we have learned to explain how things work. We began by looking at the grammatical features of explanation writing and how these supported helping others to understand concepts before applying them to our own work. Together, we imagined how a robotic dog might function and the features and uses that it would have before writing a detailed explanation of how certain parts worked.

<u>Maths</u>

In maths we have continued to practise our arithmetic and have improved the speed and accuracy of our calculations. We continued our work on fractions before moving on to looking at finding equivalences between percentages, fractions and decimals and how to convert one to the other.

Topic—The Industrial Revolution

We conducted research into the working lives of Victorian children of the working classes and the hardships that they faced in having to earn a wage. After investigating the roles children had as apprentices in cotton mills, we began planning a letter to Queen Victoria herself to put an end to the miserable business of the 5:30am - 8pm working day of the Victorian mill apprentice.


This half-term, we have been focussing very much on In Art, we created our own art work inspired by the

industrial landscape paintings of L.S. Lowry. We copied his colour pallet and tried to create a sense of perspective, light and shadow.



<u>R. E</u>

In R.E, we discussed the question "Is Christianity still a 'strong' religion 2000 years after Christ?" and we discovered how elements of Christianity are present in our everyday and annual lives. Furthermore, we looked at Christian charities and the current work that they do. Further to this, we looked at the Ten




Commandments and how they are present both in aspects of our Highwood Values, our laws and how they have links to other religions.

<u>Science</u>

In science, we have begun to find out about electricity and how circuit diagrams are drawn. We investigated the idea of resistance and why wire length affects the brightness of a bulb in a circuit. Towards the end of the term, we have been looking at the properties of light and what the concept of reflection is before attempting to apply what we learned about writing explanation texts to an explanation

piece about how a periscope works.

<u>Willow News</u> Literacy— Where would your journey take you?

After an chilly bus trip to the Berkshire Museum of Aviation, the children have been designing and writing

about their own 'Magnificent Flying Machines'. The children constructed their own success criteria for writing including using conjunctions, adjectives, punctuation and finger spaces. We have also been working hard in phonics and spelling on using letter names to spell common words

and forming all of the capital letters. In phonawareness, we have been working with Mrs Walker on remembering the number of words in different sentences and clapping the number of syllables in words.

Maths— Number and Calculation



Look at us recalling addition and subtraction facts to 20 by working out how many cubes are in the bag and how many are left!

This half term we have been revisiting some aspects of number that we covered in the Autumn Term with a focus on mental and written methods. At first, it was a brave step to do subtraction without Numicon, but with lots of perseverance, the children are now using number lines, counting backwards using fingers and written methods for subtraction including 2-digit numbers! They have also been working hard on mental recall of number bonds and beginning to use multiplication and division with the 10 times table to solve word problems.


> about their own 'Magnificent Flying Machines'. The children constructed their own success criteria for writing including using conjunctions, adjectives, punctuation and finger spaces.

Foundation StageWow can you believe we have reached the summer term already? We have had so
much fun already but the summer term will be the best! Our topic for this term will
be 'How to be a superhero'. We will begin by looking at every day heroes including
the police, fire service and doctors. In literacy will be looking at lots of non-fiction
books and our role play area will be a doctors surgery. In science we will be looking
at how to keep our bodies healthy including what we eat. Our maths work will fo-
cus on consolidating our number knowledge including doubling and halving and
number facts. After half term we will be looking at fictional superheroes . If you
have any books or toys that we could use please send them in.



Year 1



We are just about to head into the final term of Year 1. The year has gone so fast and it has been fantastic to see how much the children have progressed. The whole of the summer term will be focused on 'Where do families and people go on days out?' Our literacy will focus on different books about outings to the seaside and the park, including the book 'When the crayons came home' by Drew Daywalt and Oliver Jeffers. In maths we will continue to learn about time and then learn about money. In science we will be learning about plants and weather. We are hoping to make a garden with flowers and vegetables, which we will hopefully eat (the veggies!) by the end of Summer 2 with a nice outdoor picnic.



Year 2



It is hard to believe that we are about to be in the final term of the year! The start of this term will be largely based around SATs practice and ensuring that the children are fully prepared for the papers they will sit in May. We will do some practice papers beforehand to ensure that the children know exactly how to sit and behave during the tests. You can help at home by reading with your children and doing their number bonds with them everyday for ten minutes each. This will prepare them for the reading and arithmetic tests. In between SATs we will be asking the question 'What is the difference between a cake and a biscuit?', with a particular focus on Huntley and Palmers. This learning will allow us to focus on instruction writing, comparative writing and writing to persuade. During this topic we will also be learning about measures and at the end of the year we will use what we have learnt to do some baking! In Science the children will begin to learn about plants. We will plant our own seeds and keep a record of their progress.



Hot Off The Press...

Here is a sneak preview of our curriculum for the term ahead. It is sure to be jammed packed with exciting and engaging learning opportunities.



The Stone Age is our summer topic, as we think about why Stonehenge was built? We will use maps to locate the famous stone circle and even enjoy a visit to the incredible site later in the summer term. As we find out more about the Stone Age we will discover how the ancient people lived and found food as well as how they chose settlements in order to survive. Linking to our science topic, the children will investigate and find out more about different rocks and soils as well as understanding light and shadow. In literacy we will be looking at traditional tales and fairy stories. In maths we will continue to strengthen our number knowledge as well as looking at graphs and statistics. We will also be looking at telling the time. In art we will be thinking about sketching and learning about cave paintings.

In the last term of year 4 we will be exploring the question, 'why would someone build a castle here?'. In writing we will be creating discussion texts where the children will be able debate the merits and problems of building castles in different locations. We will then be writing fantasy stories set in or around mythical castles. We will be exploring what life was like for people living inside castles and which castles still house people to this day. In science we will be looking at how electricity works and how different materials change state. The children will be continuing with their cornet lessons, which they seem to be enjoying and they are beginning to show real progress. The big focus of the term though will be our residential trip to Swanage where the children will be able to experience a castle first hand, explore different locations and take part in fun activities with their friends!

Our final topic of the year will comprise of many different subjects that will aim to answer the question: 'Are heroes and villains so different?' We will study the play *Macbeth* by William Shakespeare, looking at how different characters are portrayed. We will create our own heroes and villains based on the story and write our own stories around them. We will also look at the poem '*The Highway Man*' and debate whether he was a hero or a villain. In history, we will learn about the Ancient Greeks, looking at the roles villains and heroes played in Greek mythology. Towards the end of the topic we will also look at how ancient Greece has influenced the western world. In science, we will learn about living things and their habitat and we will study the life cycles and reproduction of some plants and mammals. We will also start to learn about some of the changes that occur as humans develop to old age.

The beginning of the summer term will see us knuckle down, focus as we prepare the best we can for SATs week (14th—17th May). Our first weeks back will be mainly focussed on revision of maths, grammar and spelling, as well as practising reading comprehension techniques. We will make a start on our topic, "What is the Secret to Success?" by looking at what it means to be successful, and how we can take responsibility for leading a healthy and happy life. We will study the lives of successful entrepreneurs and we will start to think about what projects we could do to become more enterprising and how to write a "pitch" or promotional text. In Science, we will look at how our bodies work and how we can live a healthy lifestyle by eating a balanced diet and exercising.

This Summer term the children from FS2-Yr6 will be covering 10 different types of run, jump and throws within our suite of athletics lessons. These will focus on the very basics for KS1 in throwing and jumping through to year 6 working with technical support in pace, power, stamina & mentoring an athlete. We will also be working on "striking, catching & throwing" in cricket, from the basics in KS1 right through to full Kwik Cricket matches and the opportunity to represent Highwood in the Wokingham Schools Cricket league 2018. I am very much looking forward to teaching the children and hoping for much more pleasant weather to teach in!
