'Where Individuals Matter'

Dear Parents/Carers,

As of 29th March, the government guidelines have changed and the 'Stay at Home' rule has ended. People are now allowed to meet outside - including in private gardens - in groups of up to six, or as two households. Outdoor sports facilities can reopen and celebratory events, such as weddings, are now allowed to be held.



Whilst these are extremely welcomed changes, I would like to ask for our whole community to approach these new guidelines with caution. The guidance still remains that, from a school perspective, if we have positive cases confirmed then class bubbles will continue to close. I am acutely aware of the impact this has on everyone involved, not just on the children, but on parents ability to work with appropriate childcare in place for the duration of the 10 day isolation period. Our collective effort to limit the potential of further bubble closures would be very much appreciated, so that we can enjoy the new freedoms whilst still playing our part in keeping everyone at Highwood as safe as we can.

We have begun our reflections on the elements of our Remote Education provision that we think would be useful to stop, start or continue. One of the big successes we had was the use of Microsoft TEAMs and Year group email addresses as a form of communication and we plan to continue their use.



We have asked staff and children what, if anything, their suggestions would be and I would like to include parents in that conversation. If there is anything you think that you would like to feedback to the school then please do so via the school office.


Foundation 1 News Miss Nunn


The children have been looking at 'teen numbers' and investigating one more and one less. We have also been learning to add and subtract single digit numbers using concrete objects to help us.

English


To fit perfectly with our theme of exploring the world, Year 2 have written their own information text about the

We have been reading 'The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe' which is set in the wondrous land of Narnia. We have loved


exploring this magical land and we have been gripped by the good versus evil battle!

Could we exist without water?


English

Maths

Year 3 have had great fun this term writing magic door stories, concrete poems and biographies. The biographies were inspired by women who have spent their life working with water. We loved researching about these inspirational people!

Our concrete poems on water looked amazing - we loved using onomatopoeia.

Our magic door stories transported us to many wonderful water-themed locations.



Whole Class Reading

We read the classic 'Wind in the Willows' this

term and the children could see the differences between each of the character's personalities. There is so much wonderful vocabulary in this book! 'The River Singers' is similar to The Wind in the Willows in using

animals as central characters. We even learnt the word anthropomorphism that describes the use of animals in human form, as seen in both books.

Fractions! We tried so hard with these during this term. The children have been able to bring in their prior knowledge of division to help them find fractions of amounts. We then moved onto looking at angles - you can quiz any of us about right, acute and obtuse angles! We also worked on parallel and perpendicular lines. Speaking of lines - we can measure really well now too! Recently, we have started to look at money, so watch out because now we can know exactly how much we would like

in our piggy banks!





Topic

We started off our new key question gathering information on the different ways in which water is used daily and worldwide. The children were surprised to see how much of an impact water has on our lives. They also had great fun designing their own boats to introduce the importance of how water can be used as a form of transport. We were really impressed by their own research into different water-dwelling animals - amazing work, Year 3!

What did the Romans do for us?

This term year 4 have been learning all about the Romans and their invasion of the British Isles. It was incredible to see how much enthusiasm the children had for this topic, even though most of it was done remotely.

Maths

In maths this term the children explored everyone's favourite topic, fractions! We learned to find fractions of amounts, add fractions and find equivalent fractions.

After fractions we moved onto different methods for multiply mentally and formal written methods. Just to make it a bit more challenging, we threw in some problem solving, which the children seemed to thoroughly enjoy.

Since being back in school post lockdown, year 4 have moved onto methods of division. This has combined the children's knowledge of times tables, place value and grouping.



Writing

Over the lockdown period, year 4 learned how to write ters for the time setting. The children wrote some terrific character descriptions using their tremendous vocabulary and grammatical skills.

After Roman Myths we moved onto Playscripts, which again were linked to the Romans. All the adults in year 4 were incredibly impressed with the engaging plots the children wrote, and who knows, we might have some budding playwrights in

Recently we have been working on biographies, starting with autobiographies and moving on to writing a biography of Boudicca.

Reading

This term we have been reading 'The Thieves of Ostia' by Caroline Lawrence. The children seem to have really

enjoyed the text so far and are curious to see who has committed the crime.


During lockdown we focussed mainly on the children's retrieval skills, asking them to find information contained in sections of the book. We have loved being back in school, to share our learning and to address our question 'What would a world without war look like?"

English

We have loved reading this term. Both books addressed





the issue of war and life for History and Geography child refugees. This opened up great discussions and allowed for insightful comparisons to be made between our lives and the

lives of refugees (in the present and the past).

In writing, we built on the descriptive writing about The Blitz (which the children did at home), to create newspaper reports. We have also leamt how to write a balanced argument "We should never go to war" in order to address the United Nations.



Maths

Learning about fractions was a challenge (especially during lockdown). Since returning to school, we have prac-



tised these skills and the children have surprised themselves at how much they know! We have revised 3D shapes and learnt how to construct nets. Over the last 2 weeks, we have discovered a love of algebra in order to solve number problems.

Topic

Over the last few weeks, our topic has focussed on art, history, geography and computing.

Art

As artists, we evaluated the work of a variety of war artists (William F Draper, Laura Knight, Paul Nash,



Edward Ardizonne). We then used their work to inspire our own water colour paintings of war landscapes.

The children showed a real enthusiasm for history. We were impressed with how much they had researched about WW2 at home. Our class discussions were interesting and informed. We spent time looking at how far the war actually spread during WW2, and why so many

countries became involved. We also looked at Reading and compared it to Dusseldorf (the city in Germany that Reading is twinned with), to see how WW2 affected both places.



Computing

In computing, we enjoyed the challenge of using the programme scratch to code a sequence for changing traffic lights. This needed considerable teamwork, creativity and perseverance.

In PE, the children have been learning racket skills. This has involved tennis with Mr Edwards and badminton with Miss Bocutt. They have also had the opportunity to play golf.



As parents, it was up to us to supervise the kids as they worked through the lesson objectives - which I can tell you was easier said than done with my two! If your children were anything like mine, it took a huge effort every day to ensure the work was completed.

I totally identify with the difficulties experienced by those of us working from home while trying to implement remote learning...but I know I am not alone in gaining a new sense of appreciation for what a school does to nurture and educate our children on a daily basis. As a governing body, we are very proud of the efforts made by Mr. Hickey and the staff, under extremely difficult circumstances, to get the kids through this past year, and in particular this Spring term.

The governing body has continued to meet regularly - virtually of course! - across all of our normal committees, supporting the school wherever possible. We've also kept one eye on our longer term strategy as a school. We've remained engaged with governor training courses and have continued to make significant inroads with our preparation for any future Ofsted visit, recently meeting with one of Wokingham's School Improvement Officers.

The governing body is also supportive of the school's wellbeing initiatives for our pupils and staff. The conversation on mental health, which was already well underway before the outbreak of COVID-19, has become even more important as a result of the pandemic. To me, Highwood has always been a school that cares, an example being the weekly check-in phone calls, which were very much appreciated in our house.

To finish, the governors would like to place on record their huge thanks to our fantastic Highwood staff, our pupils and our parents. The whole Highwood community has pulled together in some, frankly, unimaginable circumstances.
