

Dear Parents/Carers,

It has been so nice this term to get back to a lot of Highwood's traditional events. There is nothing quite like a school nativity to help get everybody in the Christmas spirit! This, alongside our SPLAT events and Winter Fayre, have created a really nice atmosphere this term with many of our exciting activities and opportunities being shared inside this newsletter.



Academisation Update

Thank you to everyone who took part in our consultation about becoming an Academy and joining the Orchard Learning Alliance (OLA). At a meeting on Monday 21st November, the Governing Body discussed all of the questions that you raised, and took the decision that we would become an Academy and join the OLA. This is a significant decision, but it definitely isn't the end of the process, and the questions you raised will help us make the OLA the best possible home for Highwood. Thank you all for your engagement, and please continue to get in touch if you think of any further questions.

Attendance

Attendance is a really high priority for us at the minute and a lot of school resources are being targeted at improving the data. At the time of writing this newsletter, our attendance for the year to date is **92.8%.** National Average for last year was **95.4%**

We understand that children can become ill and we know that a lot of seasonal illness is contributing to the figure. We want to be able to work with parents to make sure that if children are well enough to attend, that we can make this happen.



School success starts with attendance

What is a much greater concern is our level of Persistent Absenteeism. A child is identified as a Persistent Absentee if they are **below 90% attendance**.

In 2020 - 2021 the **National Average for Persistent Absenteeism was 12.1%**. At Highwood for the same period of time, our **Persistent Absenteeism level was 23.2%** - almost **double the national average**. This figure means that nearly 1 in 4 children at Highwood missed over 10% of their education during last academic year.

At the time of writing this letter, our current level Persistent Absenteeism is at 22.8%. I hope that we can successfully work with all families to significantly decrease this figure and have more of our children in school for more of the time.

Welcome to our Foundation 1 News. We have had a very busy second half of the Autumn Term in F1. We have been continuing to explore our termly topic 'What makes us special?' by looking at our sense of taste, hearing and sight.



We have learnt about the other senses which we use every day - sight, taste and hearing. We learnt all about firework night and the different sounds we might hear and made our own binoculars and telescopes when we learnt about sight. The children have also been focusing on listening in phonics, learning to distinguish between different sounds they hear with their ears.

Welcome to the Foundation Stage Newsletter! It has been such a busy and exciting half term, continuing with our topic question 'Could dinosaurs live in Woodley?', and with all of our other learning - take a look!



We started the term looking at the different ways that dinosaurs move; we compared animals that we see today who resembled dinosaurs and discussed extinction and how it might have happened. Our WOW event, a dinosaur day, was very exciting. We baked dinosaur biscuits, and looked closely at fossils.

In maths the F2 children have been learning about sequencing. They have been using objects to make a 2 colour repeated pattern and a 3 colour repeating pattern! We introduced numicon and worked together to order them in different ways. We have also been exploring 2D shapes - going on a shape hunt and exploring how we can manipulate shapes to create effects.





We were delighted to welcome you all back into school for our SPLAT session. It was such a lovely atmosphere. The children certainly enjoyed completing the activities with their parents.

History and DT

As part of our Key Question, we have been looking at the history



of the school and of Woodley and the surrounding area. We can explain some of the key ways the school and

Woodley has changed and even how we think they will change in the future! We did lots of activities to explore how Highwood has changed, including making timelines! We have also completed our first DT project, making Christmas biscuits. We started by

researching different types of biscuits to decide what we liked and what we wanted our biscuits to be like. We then made different



designs of Christmas inspired biscuits and evaluated which was our favourite. We took some biscuits with us to The Birches and shared them with the residents. They were delicious!

Maths

Over the last couple weeks we have been

focusing on 3d and 2d shapes. We have been naming them and sorting them according to their properties. We have investigated which ones would roll or build the most



stable tower, based on their properties.

English

This term we have been looking at traditional tales, focusing on 'The Three Little Pigs.' We loved reading the story



and identifying all of the key phrases we would need to use. We have practised retelling the story a lot, both orally and through some drama! The children have written their own versions of The Three Little

Pigs, choosing their own animals. We were very impressed by their creativity and the way they challenged themselves with their word choice to think of the

most interesting adjectives possible. We also discovered some amazing acting skills with the children thinking hard about their expression and actions to tell the story.

Was the Great Fire of London a total disaster?

Topic

Maths

This term the children have been using their number bonds to solve addition and subtraction calculations. They have had a lot of concrete practice with the dienes and ones. This has enabled the children to be more

confident when solving calculations independently.



Music and DT

We have been busy learning the songs for our Christmas Nativity and looking at the different tones and pitches to our voices. In DT we have investigated the different materials that a Tudor house

would be made from and planned and designed our own Tudor house, ready to use our creativity skills to build a Tudor house.


Year 3 News



English

Science and Key Question Lessons



During the second part of the Autumn Term, we focused on writing newspapers, linked to the

Maths

This side of half term, we have been exploring fractions: find equivalent fractions, converting between improper fractions and mixed numbers, and comparing fractions.

Art

We have finished the term with a very exciting art day where we started to look at the work of three different artists: Jackson Pollock, Michael Carroll and Peter Thorpe.



Learning new techniques, we then created a piece of art work based on space.

It has been a super start to the year. We look forward to continuing this hard work after Christmas!

Looking back over this Autumn Term, we can't believe how much we have learnt and done. We have continued to address our question '**Does Change Always Lead to Progress?**' through English, History, Science and the Arts. Year 6 would like to wish a Happy Christmas to all our families and friends.

English

After half-term we immersed ourselves in poetry. We read and performed a variety of poems, and collected our favourite ones for display. We then wrote our own poems inspired by Robert MacFarland's Red Fox.



We have thoroughly enjoyed our whole class reading book 'Cogheart' by Peter Bunzl. It is an exciting adventure story that includes themes such as, what it means to be human; trust and betrayal; friendship and kindness.

In writing, we have used our knowledge of the Industrial Revolution to write biographies about influential men and women of the time, how their lives contributed to their successes, and how we benefit from their legacies today.

Maths

We have continued to hone our arithmetic skills and use them to solve mathematical problems. We have had a huge focus on skills involving fractions: addition and subtraction of fractions, multiplying and dividing; and fractions of an amount. The children have worked incredibly hard and have made excellent progress.

Science

In Science, we started off finding out about Darwin and how he developed his theory of evolution. We investigated how the different beaks of finches had adapted over many generations so that they were better able to survive on the food that grew on different islands of the Galapagos.

Recently, we have begun to build on our knowledge and understanding of electricity. We have learned the scientific symbols for electrical components, and how these can be combined to make a circuit.

History

As historians, we studied the impact that railways had on the people of Britain. And asked, whether they were a change for good or bad? We then looked at the development of the Great Western Railway and how Reading

Station has changed over time.

Geography

We have been learning about the British Empire and the countries that were



impacted by the actions of the British. We studied their locations and found them on a map.



Engineering

As part of our work on 'the industrial revolution', we have been visited by different engineers who have shared their experienc-

es with the children. We thank them for giving up their time and inspiring a possible future generation.

PE

In PE with Mr Edwards, we have been learning about fitness and how important it is to exercise as well as learning how to coach others in ball skills. We have continued with swimming being a key component of the curriculum and 6P have enjoyed regular lessons at Blue Coats.




And just like that, we have come to the Christmas break!
