Dear Parents/Carers,

This Spring Term always seem to fly by, but we have still managed to fill the weeks with a huge amount of exciting learning. This issue is filled with examples of the fantastic opportunities that Highwood children receive.

School Library:

We have been able to open our new library to children during this term!! There are still more books on order and some of our current books still to add onto the new library system, but we have been able to timetable all classes to access our brand new space. It has been amazing to see classes having stories read to them by their teachers and seeing the children's reactions every time





Attendance

I updated you last term with our concerns around Attendance, in particular our Persistent Absenteeism. Last academic year, the National Averages for attendance was <u>95.4%</u> and the Persistent Absenteeism was <u>12.1%</u>.

In our February Newsletter, our attendance percentage was <u>93.5%</u> and <u>Persistent Absenteeism level was 20.7%</u>. Our year to date figures have since dropped slightly with our attendance figure is at <u>93.0%</u> but our <u>Persistent Absenteeism has continued to decrease and is now 19.6%</u>

Governing Body News


Dear Parent and Carers

Children in Year 5 were knowledgeable with their vocabulary during Whole Class Reading. I was fascinated about the words they looked up from their book, 'Letters From The Lighthouse' by Emma Carroll. The children used dictionaries to look up terms and wrote them down to stick on the English display. How many words do you know: "bewildered, retorted, precariously, withering, kosher and grogne"?

Lessons were interesting and teachers consistently checked understanding of instructions given to students.

The classroom displays for Maths were eye-catching and informative, and great to see the bar model, part whole model and an array. Loved the description of an array as a chocolate bar (which I had known that back in my university days).



Really enjoyed being in the Resource area learning the imperative (bossy) words for making a Jam sandwich. It made me hungry!

Pupils across the age groups were engaged in the activities and really seemed to be enjoying them. They were confident with their responses when asked questions about their activities and accurate with their explanations.



I came away with the feeling that our children are engaged with the lessons and this was evident by how many children, across all classes, were eager to put their hand up and contribute by attempting to answer the teacher's questions.

The art activity in Year 5 was thought provoking and extended the pupils' thinking skills. EYFS pupils were proud of their phonic books and eager to show them off. Also enjoyed talking to them about the seasons with their wonderful tree artwork.

We started the half term with **world book day** - where we focused on '**The Smeds and the Smoos' by Julia Donaldson**. We had great fun bringing the story to life through lots of activities. The children enjoyed this cosy day in their pyjmas, getting cosy and reading stories.

Will we play with the same toys when we are older? Science, Geography and History

Maths



We have really enjoyed learning - about Toys this term. We have done lots of investigations into different materials that are used to make

toys. We have compared old and new toys, talking about the similarities and differences. We have built on our knowledge of the UK by learning about where toys are made.

English



The children have worked so hard on their writing this term. We have been exploring non-fiction texts.

We have had lots of fur or our trip to Milestones Museum and we have learnt how to write a recount to tell someone all about it! We have also been looking at nonchronological reports and using questions to find out more about materials.

We have developed lots of different skills in Maths this term. We started off with expanding our place value knowledge to numbers to 50. We have used numicon, bead strings, cubes, counters and number lines to help represent our numbers and have become more independent at problemsolving too! We have also been working on measuring length and height and we were really good at it! We have created height charts and learnt how to use rulers to find the longest and shortest objects.







We have enjoyed learning about

building using LEGO and how to construct different features of a house. In computing, we have loved programming the Kubo robots and learning how algorithms work.

English

Year 2 have been working hard to write their own information text about the continents of the world! The children have shown great teamwork skills to

research facts about each of the seven continents and enjoyed using books, fact sheets



and the iPad's to find their research. We have learnt how to use headings and subheadings to organise our information and also the importance of formal language. We are looking forward to being able to showcase our published book in the school library!

Whole Class Reading



We have been reading 'The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe' which is set in the wondrous land of Narnia. We have really

enjoyed exploring this book and using our DEREK skills to investigate the text.

Maths

We have been very busy this half term in Maths. We started off by continuing our multiplication and division unit, and then focused on length and height and mass. We enjoyed using our comparison skills to compare different weights and objects using the bucket scales and even managed to line up in height order! We are very impressed with how hard the children have been working on their

reasoning skills!





A clear highlight was designing and making our clay pots that were inspired by the artist Clarice Cliff. We used this opportunity to learn more about different techniques and styles, such as using shapes, lines and bright, bold colours.



How has water shaped our World? English Maths

Year 3 have been working incredibly hard on their biography writing and have showcased the life and careers of footballer Beth Mead and snowboarder Chloe Kim. We learnt about the lives and achievements of these inspirational women. We also wrote some brilliant poetry focused on water. The children loved making acrostic and shape poetry! We used many poetic devices such as alliteration, onomatopoeia and triplets to engage the reader.



Whole Class Reading

We have continued to enjoy reading The River Singers by Tom Moorhouse and have liked learning about the lives of the creatures who live near the water. It has been lovely to see the journey the characters have been on and how they have worked together and been resilient to overcome the challenges they have faced.



The children have also been very enthusiastic about using our lovely, new library!


We have been working incredibly hard in maths looking at division in a variety of ways. We have been dividing a 2-digit number by a 1-digit number through regrouping and flexible partitioning (with and without remainders). The children showed this in multiple ways using concrete, pictorial and written methods. The children have also continued to develop their mental maths through their daily learning of their 8 times tables.





Topic

We have added to our learning loop with a lot more information. Our Design and Technology and Computing lessons have involved a focus on designing and creating boats. We thought carefully about the specifications and chose materials which would be able to float and be waterproof. In music we also listened to a song from the 60s called Messin' About on the River and realised that the lyrics described life on a river.

What did the Romans do for us?

This term year 4 have been learning all about the link this to how the state of Romans and their invasion of the British Isles and what matter changed over the the Romans brought over to Britain. It was incredible to time - they were even able to see how much enthusiasm the children had for this topic. describe the change to the

Maths

We have been extremely busy in maths this term learning and how the states exploring multiplication and division, mastering of matter fit into the water perimeter and even Roman numbers which linked to our topic! The children have been fantastic at finding Roman numbers around the school and are able to tell us the value of them.

We have just recently started our new topic in maths, everyone's favourite topic, fractions! We have explored identifying fractions, fractions on a number line and mixed numbers. We look forward to continue our learning after the break.

We are still focussing on our times tables work every week and getting the children ready for the multiplication test in the summer term. If you could find some time at home to support with this as well it will make a huge difference to their knowledge.

Writing

Over the past few weeks we have been working on our non-fiction skills and learning many facts about Romans. The children particularly enjoyed learning about Boudicca and her role in fighting for her country against the Romans. It was lovely to see the work produced when they could take these facts and create a biography on Boudicca! We have recently been putting our knowledge to the test by writing a speech. The children have turned into a Roman solider who needs to convince the rest of Rome to go and invade Britain. We cannot wait to see their performances.

Science

This term, in science, we started off by recapping our knowledge on what makes a solid, liquid and gas and what each of their particles would look like. The children became scientists and conducted an experiment to see what would happen



when we apply heat to an ice cube. They were able to link this to how the state of matter changed over the time - they were even able to describe the change to the candle too! We then linked this back to our previous learning and how the states of matter fit into the water cycle. It was lovely to see how many key words they could remember from their geography learning while



adding in their new scientific language.

This term has been a busy one with lots of hard work but also lots of fun. We have continued to address our key question, '**What would a world without war look like?**'



English

Our whole class reading book this half term has been, 'When Hitler Stole Pink Rabbit' by Judith Kerr. The children have enjoyed getting to know Anna and Max (German Jewish siblings who become refugees during WW2). We used this and the introduction to

Carrie's War (by Nina Bawden) to inspire us in our writing of an evacuee story. We are now learning how to present one side of a balanced argument: "Were the

actions of Hitler justified?" in order to address the question 'What would a world without war look like?'. The children are drawing upon their knowledge from history lessons to support their arguments.



Maths

In maths, we have continued to focus on arithmetic and have enjoyed using SumDog to support us with this. We have also learnt about fractions, decimals and percentages, understanding how to find equivalents and compare them. We are moving on to recapping area and perimeter in slightly more depth.

Art

As artists, we have evaluated the success of Propaganda posters during WW2. We have learnt how to create a stamp for printing using Styrofoam; evaluating what worked well when trying to create a clean print. We are excited to be creating our final pieces this week!



History and Geography

The children have continued to show a real enthusiasm for learning about WW2. In Geography, we looked at Reading and compared it to Dusseldorf (the city in Germany that Reading is twinned with), to see how WW2 affected both places. In History, we learnt about what it was like to be a young person in Germany in the 1930s under Nazism.

PSHE

In PSHE we have enjoyed our Growing and Changing topic thinking about how humans develop and also the influence that media has over us. The children have

thought analytically about how things online are not always as they seem, especially in advertising.



Computing

Our computing lessons have been a real highlight. We have used the programme Scratch to create algorithms that light up a traffic light. Everyone really enjoyed trying to fix the bugs in the sequence and work out how to get two traffic lights working in sync!

PE

We have enjoyed playing Boccia and New Age Kurling during our indoor PE lessons. The children have used teamwork to out-play each other. With Mr Edwards, the

children have taken part in fitness challenges and have enjoyed a spot of golf!

Literacy: All Around the World and Writing Instructions


