Dear Parents/Carers,

As the majority of you will be aware from previous communications and through my update at our Meet The Teacher evening in September, last year we made an application to convert to academy status and join the Orchard Learning Alliance.

Earlier this year our application was approved, and we have been issued with an Academy Order. We are one of 9 schools - 8 in Wokingham and one in Reading - which will be joining Waingels College in the Orchard Learning Alliance.



We share a common set of values – all focussed on excellence, and social justice through exceptional schools. Our belief is that there is greater strength and security in belonging to a family of schools and that together we will be able to secure the best outcomes for our children and a bright future for our schools in the service of our communities for many years to come. These are exciting times, and we are proud to be founding members.

Because the scale of our plans is so great, and following advice from the Department for Education, our growth as a trust will be in 3 phases. Phase 1 schools will join this academic year; phase 2 is planned for 2024/25 and we hope that phase 3, will follow later in 2025. All the schools have agreed a partnership arrangement, which means we will begin to operate like a Trust until each phase gets the green light to officially join.

Southlake / Hawkedon / Churchend are in the first phase of growth and will join the Trust this academic year, probably in the Spring term.

Highwood will be in either phase 2 or phase 3 which will happen towards the end of 2024 and in 2025. As soon as a decision has been taken about which phase we will be in, I will let you know.

In the meantime, and until our plans are fully implemented, we will continue to work closely with our partners, sharing best practice, collaborating on school improvement, and exploring ways of generating greater efficiencies through economies of scale.

What do we do?

A school governing board has three primary duties:

- 1. To set the vision, ethos and strategic direction of the school.
- 2. To hold the head teacher to account for the educational performance of the school.
- 3. To oversee the financial performance and ensure that money is well spent.

We are not involved in the day-to-day management of the school.

Operational decision making is performed by the School Leadership Team (SLT) - Head Teacher, Deputy Head and senior leaders.

We are focused purely on the strategic and the longer-term objectives.

We are all volunteers and are dedicated to making Highwood a great school for pupils, parents, staff and the local community.

We have regular meetings every term, each with a specific focus to meeting our objectives:

Resources – To manage finances and school spending

Quality of Education (QE) - To review and analyse the school data and curriculum opportunities

Full Governing Board (FGB):

Monitoring the School Development Plan (SDP) To set and review the whole school's strategy, aspirations and long-term goals

Welcome to our first Foundation 1 News this year. We have had a very busy start to the Autumn Term in F1. All the children have settled incredibly well and have begun making friends. We have begun exploring our termly topic 'What makes us special?' which will allow us all to get to know each other and explore ourselves as individuals.

We started off this half term by learning all about each other and discovering how we are all different and unique. The children drew their own self-portraits, looking at their features in a mirror and were encouraged to speak about their families. We have been learning about our bodies and the different parts of it and learnt a new verse of Head Shoulders Knees and Toes.





We have been developing our self-confidence and communication skills by telling our friends about our families and interests through our All About Me boxes. We've talked about what makes us the same as our friends and what makes us different.

When continuing to explore our senses, the children learnt about using their senses in the Autumn time. We explored lots of Autumn objects such as pine cones, conkers and acorns while learning about the different things they can expect to see as the season changes. The children have become really good at noticing things by looking closely.

As we move into Autumn, we have been out in the woods exploring, building tents, digging in the mud looking for worms and making Autumn soup in the water tray.





We've also been learning about the different jobs people do as we've been getting better at helping each other with jobs in school. We know we can ask any grown-up in school for help and have loved our doctors' surgery and police station roleplay.

Throughout this half of term all the children having been trying very hard to develop their independence and do things for themselves. This includes washing and drying their own hands, putting on their own coats, feeding themselves at lunch time and taking off and putting on their own shoes.



been doing lots of handwriting practice and trying to make sure we use our best handwriting in our writing. Whole Class Reading

Our understanding of place value and our mental maths skills have about the fire and it helped us greatly when learning about larger numbers and calculation this half term. We can



now count in multiples 2s, 5s and 10s! Not only that, we have addition problems, including learning how to exchange tens and ones when adding larger numbers together.

Art

We have thoroughly enjoyed learning how to weave this term. We have studied different weaving techniques and looked at which materials would be best for weaving. The finished

paper weaving that we created has made us very proud of what we can do!

What did pre-historic people yabba dabba do? Reading and Writing Maths

We have really enjoyed rewriting the ending of 'Stone Age Boy' in English. The children have loved creating their own stone age characters and animals. We are working hard on neat handwriting and presentation and did very well when publishing our finished works! We have also enjoyed further understanding the Stone Age through Whole Class Reading where we read 'The First Drawing' which the children really enjoyed and developed many reading skills.

We have really focused on place value this term and are confident working with 3-digit numbers. We've started looking at adding and subtracting and in mental maths have had a real focus

on our 5 times

table.





Science

Our science has also linked with our big question and the Stone Age. We can now sort rocks and soils into groups based on their properties and have tested their strength using different experiments. We've also learnt about how fossils are formed.

So, what did prehistoric people yabba dabba do? We began to answer this question by plotting some key events on a timeline (a loo roll timeline!). It helped some of us to realise how long ago this time period was! We have really enjoyed looking at the geography of Stone Age people too. We know that Stone Henge is located in Salisbury, and we learnt about Avebury and Maiden Castle - all very famous Stone Age sites. We also learned about Skara Brae which we will continue to learn about when reading 'The boy with the bronze axe' in Whole Class Reading. We even know about the different way land was used in Stone Age times compared to today!

Welcome to the first edition of the Year 4 news! We are pleased to say that we've had a fantastic start to the school year, with lots of exciting opportunities and lots of new learning going on. Please read on to find out more!

What is More Precious: Water or Gold?

Year 4 have been busy investigating the Ancient Egyptians and how their wealth and the river Nile were important to their success.

We have learned all about the Ancient Egyptian Gods and why they were important. Year 4 even had a go at creating their own Ancient Egyptian god and writing their name in hieroglyphics!





In maths this term the children explored and concreted their understanding of numbers and place value. We have been using our place value skills to partition numbers in standard and non-standard ways. They also learned how to round numbers to the nearest 10, 100 and 1000. We have also begun to use the written column addition and subtraction method to help solve problems.

Our times table knowledge is coming along well, but any extra practise that could be done at home would really benefit your children.

English

In our writing, we have learned how to write non-chronological reports and persuasive brochures.

Year 4 researched lots of interesting facts about the River Nile and then used their writing skills to engage the reader.



In persuasive writing, the children learned how to use imperative verbs and boastful language to make Egypt sound like the most exciting trip you could go on.

Year 4 have been reading 'Secrets of a Sun King' and the class seem to be thoroughly enjoying it. We have been exploring exciting new vocabulary and summarising the sections by deciding on the key events so far.

Science

In Science, we have been looking at states of matter, with a really exciting experiment where we investigated melting points. This has really supported our learning



in Geography where we have spent time learning about the water cycle. Playing Solids, Liquids, Gases was a real highlight for many people in 4P!



Geography

In Geography we have explored the River Nile and its importance to the Ancient Egyptians. We then learnt the features of a



river and how it travels from the source into mouth of seas and lakes. The children used their creativity to represent them using a range of materials.

Welcome to the first newsletter for Year 6. Although we have only been back in school a matter of weeks, we have already achieved a lot. Our topic this term is, '**Does Change Always Lead to Progress?**', and we have been thinking about this through English, History and Geography.

English

This half-term, we have immersed ourselves in poetry. We have read a variety of poems and then written our own poems inspired by Robert MacFarland's Red Fox.



In whole class reading, we have thoroughly enjoyed our reading book 'Cogheart' by Peter Bunzl. It is an exciting adventure story that includes themes such as, what it means to be human; trust and betrayal; friendship and kindness.

In writing, we have used Cogheart as inspiration to answer the question: Should mechanicals be treated like humans?

Maths

So far in maths, we have been securing our understanding of place value. We have been learning how to read, write and compare large numbers (up to 10,000,000). We have been investigating negative numbers and rounding. We have been working hard on improving the speed and accuracy of our arithmetic. We have now moved on to understanding the core skills of addition, subtraction, multiplication and division.

Science and Computing

In Science, we have thought about how living things are classified. We have learnt about how to create a classification key (or branching diagram), using

characteristics of different living organisms. This has then linked into our Computing where we have been learning about databases.


<u>Literacy: This Is Not My Hat</u>

Household Support Fund

Money to help residents this winter

A new round of the <u>Household Support Fund</u> is now open for residents needing help paying for food and energy. The fund helps residents struggling to pay for food, bills, energy and other essentials.

Higher amounts are being paid to households this winter which are likely to spend more money on daily essentials like food and energy.

This is being distributed for Wokingham Borough Council by Age UK Berkshire, Citizens Advice Wokingham, First Days Children's Charity and Wokingham United Charities.

Any household which received a grant from Age UK Berkshire or Citizens Advice Wokingham between April and September 2023 can now apply again.

If you have a child who receives means-tested free school meals

• You can get £20 per week, per child, during school holidays from First Days Children's Charity

Pensioners, carers, disabled people and/or households with four or more people

• You can get a grant of £240 from Age UK Berkshire or Citizens Advice Wokingham

All other households

• You can get a grant of £120 from Age UK Berkshire or Citizens Advice Wokingham
