

Welcome to our Foundation 1 News. We have had a very busy second half of the Autumn Term in F1. We have been continuing to explore our termly topic 'What makes us special?' by looking at our senses of touch, taste, smell, hearing and sight.





We have learnt about the other senses which we use every day - sight, taste and hearing. We learnt all about firework night and the different sounds we might hear and made our own binoculars and telescopes when we learnt about sight. The children have also been focusing on listening in phonics, learning to distinguish between different sounds they hear with their ears.

Our favourite sense was our sense of taste! We explored the four parts of taste - salty, bitter, sweet and sour. Sweet food is our favourite but we disliked the bitter taste. We also tasted some new kinds of fruit and made our own fruit kebabs. The children made shopping lists to make sure Mrs Atkinson bought the right ingredients.







We've also enjoyed learning about Halloween, Bonfire Night and Diwali, which some of our children celebrate with their families. We pretended to be fireworks, made spooky sounds in phonics and we've collected some pumpkin seeds to plant in Spring. The children

We used our super observation skills to complete an Autumn scavenger hunt and collected lots of natural objects to use them in our craft and messy play activities too. Thank you to all the parents that have supported us during this half of term and we look forward to welcoming the children back after the Christmas break!






Topic




We have been recapping Phase 2 phonics this half term, solidifying our recognition of each sound and learning how to blend the sounds to read words. The children have also worked very hard learning



Topic



English

During the second part of the Autumn Term, we began by studying


Year 6 News

Looking back over this Autumn Term, we can't believe how much we have learnt and done. We have continued to address our question 'Does Change Always Lead to Progress?' through English, History, Science and the Arts. Year 6 would like to wish a Happy Christmas to all our families and friends.

English

In Reading, we have been studying a fantastic book, 'Clockwork' by Philip Pullman. It is a gothic fairy story in which invented characters come to life. The story actually has two separate plot lines that gradually weave into each other. Each plot has its own twists and turns,



and its own element of suspense. We have thoroughly enjoyed learning the macabre and sinister vocabulary in the story, and are using it to create our own version.

When writing, we have studied

influential men and women at the time of the Industrial Revolution, how their lives contributed to their successes, and how we benefit from their legacies today. This included writing biographies on Charles Darwin and Mary Anning - two incredibly important scientists.

Maths

We have continued to hone our arithmetic skills and use them to solve mathematical problems. We have had a huge focus on skills involving fractions: addition and subtraction of fractions, multiplying and dividing; and fractions of an amount. The children have worked incredibly hard and have made excellent progress.

Science


In Science, we started off finding out about Darwin and how he developed his Theory of Evolution. We investigated how the different beaks of finches had adapted over many generations so that they were better able to survive on the food that grew on different islands of the Galapagos.

Recently, we have begun to build on our knowledge and understanding of electricity. We have learned the scientific symbols for electrical components, and how these can be combined to make a circuit.

History

As historians, we studied the impact that railways had on the people of Britain. And asked, whether they were a change for good or bad? We then looked at the development of the Great Western Railway and how Reading Station has changed over time.

We have been learning about the British Empire and the countries that were impacted by the actions of the British. We studied their locations and found them on a
